**TODAY:** We sometimes forget that Jesus was born in a barn, not a church, and that the God of the Incarnation is as much about kitchen tables as ecclesial altars. God is as much domestic as monastic. This is important to keep in mind as we try to understand the Eucharist. The Eucharist is the body of Christ, a continuation of the Incarnation, and, like Jesus' birth, is meant to bring the divine into concrete, everyday life.\*

## Pastor's Desk

These days, people are getting very creative when they don't want to go to work. According to one survey, more than one-third of U.S. workers say they played hooky from work over the last 12 months. Twenty percent of workers say they called into work because they just didn't feel like going into the office that day. In fact, only 38 percent of unscheduled absences are due to personal illness, while 62 percent are for other reasons, including family issues, personal needs, and stress, among others.

So this weekend I have Top 10 list to share, as reported in the survey, this one listing some of the most unusual excuses workers gave to their employers for missing work.

The invited guests seem to decide that their arrival can be put off for a few hours. In their view the feast that had been prepared for them could wait.

In the matter of our invitation into the kingdom of God, the truth is, our presence is urgently requested. There can be no excuses! There can be no putting it off! The time is now! The banquet that God has prepared cannot wait! And in answering the call, should you ever feel the urge to procrastinate, I have not ten, but just one thing to say: I hope and pray that you never get around to it!

**CNA/EWTN News:** Aleppo, Syria, Oct 7, 2014 / 04:32 pm— Militants linked to al-Nusra Front kidnapped a Catholic parish priest and as many as 20 people from a Christian village in Syria on Sunday night. The priest has been identified as 62-year-old Father Hanna Jallouf, O.F.M.

"Let us pray for him and for the other victims of this tragic and senseless war," the Custody of the Holy Land said on its website.

The Custody of the Holy Land, which oversees Franciscan activity in the region, said the priest was kidnapped with several men from the Christian village of Qunaya on the night of Oct. 5-6. "We are not able to say where Father Hanna and his parishioners are now and, at this time, we have no possibility of contact with him or his captors," the Custody said.

The Franciscans have been present in Syria for 800 years, and established a presence in Qunaya in 1878.
